



COMMUNIQUE ISSUED AT THE ONE-DAY DIALOGUE ON THE ROLE OF FAITH-BASED INSTITUTIONS IN PROMOTING TRANSPARENCY, ACCOUNTABILITY, AND GOOD GOVERNANCE ORGANISED BY EDUCATION, SOCIAL AND HEALTH MISSION (MESH) AT STONEHEDGE HOTEL, ABUJA ON 29TH NOVEMBER 2023.

PREAMBLE

The Education, Social and Health Mission (MESH) - an NGO of the Nigerian Supreme Council for Islamic Affairs (NSCIA) - organised a one-day dialogue to discuss the Role of Faith-Based Institutions in Promoting Transparency, Accountability, and Good Governance in Nigeria. The overall goal of the dialogue was to leverage the influence and reach of Faith-Based Institutions in Nigeria to promote transparency, accountability, and good governance which will lead to a more just and equitable society.

During the meeting which was well attended by participants from both Christian and Muslim Faith-Based Institutions in North Central States, Nigeria, and government partners such as the Independent Corrupt Practices and Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC), nongovernmental organisations, and both Electronic and Print Media, there were various paper presentations and discussions to provide an understanding of the key issues pointing to how faith-based institutions can contribute to enthroning good governance in Nigeria. At the end of the meeting, participants identified the critical issues and came up with some recommendations and commitments on the way forward as follows:

ISSUES IDENTIFIED

Nigeria despite being a religious country with a high concentration of Muslim and Christian devotees, religious impact is not visible in governance due to lack of Transparency and Accountability

There is a growing concern about the practice of honouring those who make huge financial contributions/donations to religious houses without verifying their source of wealth hence, promoting financial ruse.

Whereas the holy books expressly uphold the virtues and values of transparency and accountability, most adherents who find themselves in public office often fall short of exhibiting these laudable virtues and values.

There is an apparent failure of the state to deliver good governance and democratic dividends, thus, weighing negatively on the masses.

Unfortunately, religion and tribalism have become the major issues pretentiously and in some cases, mischievously raised by politicians during campaigns instead of critical issues that would bring about good governance and development.

Despite the number of anti-corruption legislations and agencies of government as well as the plethora of religious institutions, corruption still remains a major challenge in Nigeria as the nation was ranked 150 out of 180 countries in 2022 by Transparency International.

OUR COMMITMENTS

Faith-Based Institutions are committed to increasing their participation in advocacy and civic engagement activities to ensure improved accountability and transparency at all levels of

Religious leaders are committed to mainstream anti-corruption messages in their sermons and other teaching avenues such as Sunday Schools, Quranic Schools, and other platforms of religious gathering.

Religious leaders are committed to the fight against corruption by first of all cleaning up their houses before taking the anti-corruption messages to society.

Faith leaders are committed to continuously leading the advocacy to the government officials and political office holders to promote anti-corruption tendencies. Faith-Based Institutions are committed to building the capacity of their congregants to engage in anti-corruption crusades using accountability tools.

Faith-Based Institutions are committed to participating in the budgetary process at the National, Sub-national, and Local government levels

Religious leaders are committed to advocating good moral teachings to their members who occupy public offices rather than soliciting financial support from them which tacitly encourages them to always pretentiously play the religious card at will in their campaigns.

The Faith leaders are committed to working with relevant government agencies such as the National Orientation Agency, EFCC, ICPC, and Code of Conduct Bureau to increase the consciousness of citizens to support the anti-corruption efforts of the government

We are committed to collectively working with Civil Society Organisations and international and local partners to seek transparency and accountability for good governance.

Participants at the programme commended the Education, Social and Health Mission (MESH) for convening the dialogue on transparency, accountability, and good governance for deepening the involvement of Faith-Based Institutions and faith leaders in the fight against corruption. They pledged to work together harmoniously on the above commitments to engage other segments of the Nigerian society to promote transparency, accountability, and good governance in Nigeria. 
